Hilda and Preston Davis Fdtn RFP - Eating Disorders Postdoc - Due $1\!/\!10$

The Hilda and Preston Davis Foundation is pleased to announce the 2013 Grant Cycle of its Postdoctoral Fellowship Program in Eating Disorders Research. By attracting postdoctoral fellows to the field, dollars allocated to support fellows are leveraged into lifetime contributions to understanding biological causes of eating disorders. The long term goal of the program is to accelerate medical research discoveries that will lead to effective new therapies. Proposals must be focused on relevant aspects of the biological causes of anorexia nervosa and bulimia nervosa as defined by clinical criteria. Clinical psychotherapeutic studies, medication trials, and obesity research are currently outside the scope of this program.

Up to five three-year fellowships ranging from \$43,000 - \$63,000 per year, inclusive of a \$3,000 expense allowance will be awarded to fellows who have completed no more than three years of postdoctoral research training as of the funding start date.

Applications are due in January 2013.

Projects for Peace 2013

Informational sessions for Projects for Peace will be held on Monday, November 5 at 5:00 PM and Tuesday, November 6 at 5:00 PM in Peabody 411. Last year's Engineers without Borders team will be presenting on their winning project at 6:00 on Monday, November 5 in Peabody 411.

Projects for Peace is an initiative for undergraduate students at Davis United World College Scholars Program schools (of which UF is one) to design their own grassroots projects for peace that they themselves will implement anywhere in the world during the summer of 2013. Through a competition on over 90 campuses, the top projects will be selected for funding at \$10,000 each.

Projects for Peace is being funded for a seventh year by Kathryn Wasserman Davis, a lifelong internationalist and philanthropist. Mrs. Davis feels some urgency to spark initiatives for building prospects for peace in the world and so is committing \$1 million to fund one hundred \$10,000 projects for peace. She believes that today's youth - tomorrow's leaders - ought to be challenged to formulate and test their own ideas. This grant is to fund the Projects for Peace award for University of Florida students.

12 Guidelines for Deciding When to Persist, When to Quit by Rosabeth Moss Kanter, HBR Blog Network

When you're getting something new going, the difference between success and failure is often a matter of time: how long you give it before you give up. Efforts that begin with high hopes inevitably hit a disappointing sag. It's Kanter's Law: "Everything can look like a failure in the middle."

In the messy middle, unexpected obstacles pop up because the path is uncharted. Fatigue sets in. Team members turn over. Impatient critics attack just when you think you're gaining traction. Tough challenges almost inevitably take longer and cost more than our optimistic predictions.

That's why persistence and perseverance are important for anyone leading a new venture, change project, or turnaround. But the miserable middle offers a choice point: Do you stick with the venture and make mid-course corrections, or do you abandon it? Do you support incumbents making progress even though the job is not yet finished, or do you abandon them for another group's unproven promises?
