## 2013 Smithsonian Institution Fellowship Program

The Smithsonian Institution encourages access to its collections, staff specialties, and reference resources by visiting scholars, scientists, and students. The Institution offers in-residence appointments for research and study using its facilities, and the advice and guidance of its staff members in fields that are actively pursued by the museums and research organizations of the Institution.

At present these fields include:

- Animal behavior, ecology, and environmental science, including an emphasis on the tropics
- Anthropology, including archaeology
- Astrophysics and astronomy
- · Earth sciences and paleobiology
- Evolutionary and systematic biology
- History of science and technology
- History of art, especially American, contemporary, African, and Asian art, twentieth-century
- · American crafts, and decorative arts
- Materials Sciences
- · Social and cultural history of the United States
- Folklife

Proposals should fall under at least one of the Smithsonian Institution's four grand challenges: Unlocking the Mysteries of the Universe; Understanding and Sustaining a Biodiverse Planet; Valuing World Cultures; and/or Understanding the American Experience. <u>POSTDOCTORAL</u> Fellowships are offered to scholars who have held the degree or equivalent for less than seven years.

SENIOR Fellowships are offered to scholars who have held the degree or equivalent for seven years or more. Applicants must submit a detailed proposal including a justification for conducting research in residence at the Institution. The term is 3 to 12 months. Both fellowships offer a stipend of \$45,000\* per year plus allowances.

\* Earth and Planetary Sciences Senior and Postdoctoral stipends are \$50,000 per year.

PREDOCTORAL Fellowships are offered to doctoral candidates who have completed preliminary course work and examinations. The applicant must submit a detailed proposal including a justification for conducting the research in-residence at the Institution. Candidates must have the approval of their universities to conduct doctoral research at the Smithsonian Institution. The term is 3 to 12 months. The stipend is \$30,000 per year plus allowances.

<u>GRADUATE STUDENT</u> Fellowships are offered to students formally enrolled in a graduate program of study, who have completed at least one semester, and not yet have been advanced to candidacy if in a Ph.D. Program.

## Center for the Study of Race & Race Relations 2013 -2014 Course Development Grants

ABOUT THE CENTER FOR THE STUDY OF RACE AND RACE RELATIONS

The CSRRR is an academic research and resource center committed to destigmatizing race. With the objective of fostering communities of dialogue, the Center embraces historically and empirically based thinking, talking, teaching, and writing on race. To this end, the Center creates and supports programs designed to enhance race-related curriculum development for faculty, staff and students in collegiate and professional schools. #### COURSE DEVELOPMENT GRANT

The Course Development Grant is intended to fund the development and teaching of an undergraduate education course substantially addressing issues of race and/or race relations. Up to two graduate student grants will be awarded, each in the amount of \$2,500. An additional stipend of up to \$500 is available for course-related materials. UF faculty members are eligible to receive \$500 as well. Grantees are expected to teach their newly-developed course either during the Fall 2013 or Spring 2014 semester.

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

It is the student's responsibility to insure that s/he is eligible to work and/or receive additional salary if they are receiving other forms of UF or external funding. Student's academic standing and eligibility for Department or College funding will be verified with the Department or College prior to the award of the Course Development Grant. ## COURSE GUIDELINES

Proposed courses should:

- Be geared toward a 4000-level course (upper division undergraduates);
- Dedicate at least 75% of course time to the study of race and/or race relations as it relates to education (courses can have a very specific focus or offer a survey of a broad topical area);
- Be of interest to a diverse range of undergraduate majors;
- Reflect the applicant's research and scholarly interests (e.g., thesis, teaching or dissertation work);
- Note: Applicant must not have previously taught the proposed course.

#### PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

Proposals should include:

- A cover letter that summarizes interest, background and experience;
- A two-page prospectus of the course including course title, description, objectives and an outline of the proposed course content (topics to be covered) and readings;
- A curriculum vita; and
- Graduate students should submit two faculty reference letters.

#### SUGGESTIONS FOR DEVELOPING A PROPOSAL

- Describe, in as much detail as possible, the substance of the course and connect substantive descriptions to course readings, requirements and activities.
- Combine seminal pieces of literature with the latest research and analysis.
- Define race broadly to include diverse racial (and ethnic) groups.
- Define key terms

## UFOAP funds still available for this year but future of funding uncertain

The University of Florida Open Access Publishing Fund (UFOAP) was launched on July 1, 2010 as a two year pilot project to support UF faculty, post-doctoral researchers, staff and students in their open access (OA) publishing endeavors by paying reasonable article-processing fees charged by open access journals when funds were not available from other sources. The UFOAP was initially funded by the Provost with \$120,000. The Fund was continued in 2012 with the generous commitment of funding by the Provost in the amount of \$75,000.

Since July 2010, the UFOAP has funded publication of 172 unique articles, benefitting 407 UF-affiliated authors from 58 academic departments in 12 colleges and the Florida Museum of Natural History. As of November 1, 2012, \$28,800 of this year's allocation remains. We will continue to accept and process applications until this amount has been expended. Continuation of the UFOAP beyond this year's funding, however, depends upon the verbal support and financial commitment of all UF academic units. We urge our UFOAP recipients and open access supporters across campus to contact their department chairs and

college deans and share your thoughts about the importance of the UFOAP and open access at UF.

The Libraries continue to encourage faculty to consider OA when publishing their scholarly works. Recent studies show that OA benefits the author because articles published online are made available much faster than those in traditional proprietary journals, thereby giving their research timely visibility, higher citation rates, and greater overall impact.

## Antique maps and rare books depicting Jerusalem showcased in Smathers Library exhibition

November 13-December 14, 2012 Smathers Library (East) Gallery, 2nd Floor

The George A. Smathers Libraries will present *Imagining Jerusalem* to coincide with the Jewish festival of Hanukkah. Imagining Jerusalem showcases antique maps, historic photographs and rare books depicting, idealizing and imagining the Holy City of Jerusalem.

In ancient times, Jerusalem was seen as the center of the physical world. Presently, it is the spiritual center for three of the world's major religions. The many imaginings and re-imaginings of this holy city have inspired the creation of countless pieces of art, poetry and prose, and have certainly influenced mapmaking. Based on sacred and historic texts, personal accounts and, of course, artistic musings, these maps and other artifacts provide a window into the real, spiritual and imagined world of Jerusalem.

The exhibition is a collaborative effort between the Map and Imagery Library and the Isser and Rae Price Library of Judaica at the University of Florida. It marks the 20th anniversary of an important donation of antique Holy Land maps by James C. and Adina P. Simmons of Tel-Aviv, Israel, and Tallahassee, Florida.

*Imagining Jerusalem* is curated by Rebecca Jefferson, Head of the Isser and Rae Price Library of Judaica and Carol McAuliffe, map librarian at the Map and Imagery Library, Spatial Information Services Unit.

## Scholarly Publishing in the Digital Age For Faculty and Graduate Students

Tuesday, November 27, 2:00 p.m. in Smathers Library (East), Room 1A

Meredith Morris-Babb, director, and Amy Gorelick, editor-in-chief, at the University Press of Florida, will speak to UF faculty and graduate students on "Scholarly Publishing in the Digital Age."

Judith Russell, Dean of University Libraries, will give the welcome and introduction

Ms. Gorelick will discuss the basics of attaining published works: submitting a proposal, when to submit a full manuscript, the review process, the production process, marketing and selling works of non-fiction, and things to avoid when working with a publisher.

Ms. Morris-Babb will discuss some of the new developments in digital publishing. The market for scholarly publications has become very tight, with both libraries and individuals buying fewer physical books than ever before. University presses must respond to the changing publishing landscape and are adapting in various digital ways.

A question and answer period will follow the brief presentation, with an opportunity for faculty to meet and discuss their own work in detail with the presenters.
