The Outsourcing Illusion: Why Tempting Technology Can Lead to Dangerous Delegation

13 October, 5:30 pm, Smathers Library (East) 100 Evan Selinger (Rochester Institute of Technology) A philosophy professor from the Rochester Institute of Technology is giving a free lecture Oct. 13 at the University of Florida on how we should consider our reliance on the growing array of smart, predictive, and labor saving technologies. This lecture is the first in a series from the UF Center for the Humanities and the Public Sphere entitled "The Work of the Humanities: Critical Thinking in Life and Labor" which includes six lectures during the fall and spring semesters. This series will show how the humanities play a key role in the future workplace.

Evan Selinger will explore how Americans are increasingly outsourcing intimate emotional labor to service providers (elder caretakers, love coaches, wedding planners, etc.), as well as tools like smart phones and self-driving cars. He will question the problematic, even tragic results of this reliance such as distorted family values and declining civic life. As we become increasingly dependent upon electronic devices, we may fall into what Selinger terms the "outsourcing illusion", or becoming submissive to technologies instead of using them to improve our lives.
