

One of the most obvious stylistic features of Athenian black-figure vase painting is the use of color to differentiate women from men. By comparing ancient art in Egypt and Greece, Mary Ann Eaverly's book Tan Men/Pale Women: *color and gender in archaic Greece and Egypt, a Comparative Approach* (2013), uncovers the complex history behind the use of color to distinguish between genders, without focusing on race. Eaverly considers the significance of this overlooked aspect of ancient art as an indicator of underlying societal ideals about the role and status of women.

Pulling the Teeth of the Tropics: Towards an Environmental

History of Public Health during the Construction of the Panama Canal

Monday, November 3 12:00-12:50 p.m. in the Communicore Building, Room C1017

Presentation by Paul Sutter, associate professor of history, director of graduate studies in history, University of Colorado at Boulder, on the environmental impacts of the Panama Canal.

Dr. Sutter received his PhD in 1997 from the University of Kansas. He teaches modern U.S. history and environmental history. He also serves as editor of the University of Georgia Press' "Environmental History and the American South" book series. He has received fellowships from the Smithsonian, Huntington Library and National Endowment for the Humanities.

He has written several books and is working on two projects, a book on the history of erosion in the American South, and a book on the environmental and public health history of the Panama Canal Construction- material from which is the subject of his upcoming talk.
