Uncertain Actions, Inexperienceable Evidence: Towards New Practices of the Future

According to philosopher Immanuel Kant, the motto of the Enlightenment is: Sapere aude—have the courage to use your own understanding. The assumption of this motto is that enlightenment is inevitable, once the public is free. This belief that the search for truth will set you free—that true knowledge leads to virtuous, collective actions—has been called into question over and over again, most recently by phenomena such as global climate change (not simply in terms of the continuing debate over its existence, but also by the temporality of climate predictions: by the time these models can be verified, it will be too late to act). Furthermore, our classic theories of causality are being challenged by a growing interest in Big Data, which emphasizes correlation rather than causality in order to make predictions about the future. Rather than bemoan this situation, this talk uses the example of global climate change models to argue for an alliance between scientists and humanities scholars in order to answer the hard questions about the relationship between theory and practice—between truth, reality, and action—that face us all.

Wendy Chun is Professor and Chair of Modern Culture and Media at Brown University. She has studied both Systems Design Engineering and English Literature, which she combines and mutates in her current work on digital media. She is author of Control and Freedom: Power and Paranoia in the Age of Fiber Optics (MIT, 2006), and Programmed Visions: Software and Memory (MIT 2011); she is co-editor (with Tara McPherson and Patrick Jagoda) of a special issue of American Literature entitled New Media and American Literature, co-editor (with Lynne Joyrich) of a special issue of Camera Obscura entitled "Race and/as Technology", and co-editor (with Thomas Keenan) of New Media, Old Media: A History and Theory Reader (Routledge, 2005). She is currently a Visiting Professor at Leuphana University (Luneburg, Germany). She has been a Member of the Institute for Advanced Study (Princeton), a fellow at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard, and a Wriston Fellow at Brown, as well as a visiting associate professor in the History of Science Department at Harvard, of which she is currently an Associate. She is working on a monograph entitled Imagined Networks.

American Institute for Medical and Biological Engineering Postdocs - application due Dec. 5

Institute for Medical and Biological Engineering (AIMBE). Please forward this note to anyone else who might be interested. If you or any of your colleagues choose to pursue an application, please let me know -- I would be happy to help with it.

The application is due December 5.

The AIMBE Scholars Program enables distinguished postdoctorates in the medical and biomedical engineering fields to serve as expert advisors to policymakers at the FDA. AIMBE Scholars work side-by-side with the most influential decision makers in Washington. Scholars inform public policy through their knowledge of the latest cutting-edge research and technological innovations. Scholars receive training about the federal policy process (including budget, regulatory, and grant processes) and build relationships with key government stakeholders. AIMBE facilitates the Scholars experience throughout the program year. Some biomedical engineers participating in the AIMBE Scholars Program return to their academic, faculty, or industry careers-with greater understanding of the connections between public policy and translational science-while others go on to build new careers in public policy.

Applicants to the AIMBE Scholars Program must hold a PhD-level degree in biomedical or biological engineering or a related field, be a U.S. citizen, and have an excellent record of achievement. Dissertations must be successfully defended by June 20, 2015 and degrees conferred by August 31, 2015 to participate.

Program Details

The AIMBE Scholars Program is a highly competitive program, consisting of one-year immersion experiences from September 1 to August 31 in the Center for Devices and Radiological Health (CDRH) within the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The program includes an <u>orientation to public policy</u>, as well as bi-monthly professional development seminars with guest speakers.

Track 1: AIMBE

Candidates that require funding from AIMBE to complete the program may apply for a yearly stipend of \$70,000, plus allowances for moving expenses to Washington and attendance at scientific conferences throughout the program-year. Stipend payments continue while the Scholar remains in the program. This funding option is most suited to early-career candidates within 10 years of receipt of their Ph.D.

Track 2: Sponsoring Institution

Candidates with sponsorship from an eligible institution shall indicate the source of sponsorship in the application.
