Copyright Essentials for the Graduate Researcher

Thursday, January 14, 12:30-1:30 p.m.

Working on your thesis or dissertation and including copyrighted works of others in your paper? Confused about the publication and deposit options available to you for your dissertation and wondering what impact these options will have on later publication of your work? This workshop will answer these common copyright questions that graduate students encounter as they write and prepare to publish their own thesis or dissertation. This workshop is a must for all graduate students working on a thesis or dissertation.

Sharing Scholarship and Reaching Research through Open and Public Access Friday, February 5, 2:00-3:00 p.m.

In this workshop, participants will learn more about open access principles and methods and about federal and private funder mandates requiring public access to scholarly research. Persons who currently receive or are considering applying for government or private grants to fund their research are strongly encouraged to attend this workshop to learn about the forthcoming requirements of public access.

Can I Use That? Fair Use for Teaching

Wednesday, February 24, 12:30-1:30 p.m.

Can you show a movie in class? Can you distribute copies of an article? What are you allowed to post on your Canvas site? This workshop focuses on the application of the copyright exception of fair use to teaching activities. Participants will learn about the four factors of fair use, application of fair use to various types and uses of materials, and how the library can help with electronic reserves and links to subscription materials. This workshop is intended for teaching faculty, instructors and graduate assistants.

Authors' Rights and Responsibilities: Understanding Copyright & Open Access in Modern Scholarly Publishing

Friday, March 18, 2:00-3:00 p.m.

In this workshop, attendees will learn about the legal relationships between author, publisher and reader in order to understand how to protect one's own intellectual property rights as authors, to respect others' rights, and to interpret common provisions in publisher agreements. Additionally, we will review the strengths and weaknesses of various publishing models including open access and best practices for locating and evaluating open access publication venues.

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Deadline Approaching - Postdoctoral Enrichment Program for Underrepresented Minorities

The **Burroughs Wellcome Fund** wants to help advance the careers of **underrepresented minority researchers** in biomedical and medical research. We believe that diversity is essential to the process and advancement of scientific innovation, academic discourse, and public service.

The Burroughs Wellcome Fund has created the <u>Postdoctoral Enrichment Program</u> (PDEP) to support early career scientists and engineers of Latino, Native-American, Pacific Island, and African-American descent. PDEP awards a total of \$60,000 over three years to postdocs in biomedical or medical research, who are citizens of the United States or Canada, and hosted at a degree-granting institution in the United States or Canada.

Funding through PDEP expressly supports participation in the following activities:

- Opportunities for the PDEP postdoctoral fellow to enhance their research productivity. Examples include travel and attendance to workshops, courses, and trainings in new techniques; or meetings and events that launch new collaborations and knowledge transfer.
- Opportunities for the PDEP mentor to develop and provide mentoring resources at their home institution, to increase the research productivity and long-term career success of the postdoctoral fellow. Examples include career guidance discussions, research management trainings, or professional development in grant writing, communication, and other skills demanded of future principle investigators.
- Opportunities for the PDEP mentor to attend an annual meeting of PDEP mentors hosted by the Burroughs Wellcome Fund.
- Opportunities for the PDEP postdoc-mentor pair to participate in a national peer network of PDEP fellows to foster inter-institutional collaboration and greater community engagement.

We need to enrich biomedical and medical research with new voices and faces. But molding a diverse research community begins with mentoring diverse talents. The Burroughs Wellcome Fund wants to hear from underrepresented postdocs and mentors working at the frontlines of scientific discovery, and invites their application for the PDEP fellowship.
