Deadline to submit for the January award is November 11, and the deadline to submit for the March award is December 22.

The award will highlight an outstanding postdoc in ANY field based on 3 primary criteria:

- 1. Publication record as a postdoc
- 2. Awards, fellowships, grants, and other recognitions (e.g. patents) received as a postdoc
- 3. Dedication to the betterment of the postdoc and/or scientific community

The awardees will have their research profile showcased in that month's issue of the Journal and will be invited to write a "Spotlight" article (review, original research, or methods paper) to be featured in the Journal of Postdoctoral Research. In addition, each Spotlight article will also have an Editorial highlighting the postdoc's work written by one of the Journal's editors.

All winners will be considered for the Postdoc of the Year Award, which comes with a \$500 travel award.

The Ecology of a Corpse: Dead Bodies in American Environmental History Ellen Stroud (Pennsylvania State University)

Thursday, 3 November, 5:30 pm, Smathers Library 100

Dead bodies have been health hazards, toxic waste, and compost for the garden, sometimes all at the same time. They have been obstacles to development, and major tourist draws; they have been both an integral part of nature and also entirely apart from it. Twentieth-century bodies and their accumulations of mercury, titanium, silicon, and plutonium, can be quite toxic, but even the early American dead had complicated relationships with their environments. In this talk, Ellen Stroud argues that understanding the history of American landscapes, environments, and ideas about nature requires spending time with bodies of the American dead.

Addressing the Gap: Resources and Support for International Graduate Students in the Humanities and Social Sciences

Monday, 7 November 2016 12:00 - 1:30 pm, Marston Visualization Lab (L136)

There is a growing gap between domestic and international students in the humanities and humanistic social sciences. The difference in available resources and institutional

support is often quite stark and the limited available resources are frequently not codified in a coherent fashion. But this situation is a result of poor communication as much as anything else. Resources exist, but may not be easily accessible; support is available, but not always utilized.

This informational workshop is an opportunity to address this gap in communication and highlight what resources and institutional support exist for international students in the humanities and the social sciences. Our presenters will focus primarily on external grants and fellowships for which international students are eligible. They will discuss the institutional challenges that one must navigate in order to avail oneself of these opportunities.

By the end of the workshop, participants will know what funding bodies support grants and fellowships for international students in the humanities and social sciences, will learn strategies for navigating the institutional challenges, and will get a better sense of what resources and contacts are available at UF to make life as an international student less challenging.
