The 2017 Annual Postdoc Research Symposium will be held on Friday, April 14th from 11:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. at Emerson Alumni Hall at the University of Florida. The goal of the University of Florida Postdoctoral Research Symposium is to promote the research of UF postdocs and to provide avenues for continued professional development as set outlined by the National Postdoctoral Association (NPA). Communication Skills and Professionalism are two of the six Core Competencies the NPA (National Postdoctoral Association) promotes as critical to postdoc success. Postdocs in both oral and poster presentations will be judged on how well they can convey their research to an educated lay audience.

Oral Presentation first place winner receives \$200. Oral Presentation second place winner receives \$100. The four winners for poster presentations - from four separate judging groups receive \$75 each.

UF Postdocs are invited to submit abstracts and elect either poster presentation or oral presentation. The top six abstract submissions will be selected by the Office of Postdoctoral Affairs (OPA) advisory committee for oral presentation. Oral presenters will be notified by April 3<sup>rd</sup> of their selection. Those not selected for an oral presentation will be invited to participate in the poster session. Judging of both oral and poster presentation will take place the day of the event. Oral presenters are expected to prepare a 10 minute PowerPoint presentation with 5 additional minutes for questions. Posters presenters will be notified of board sizing prior to the event.

To submit your abstract and be considered for judging, please complete the <u>abstract</u> <u>submission form</u> (enter GatorLink User Name and Password when prompted) by <u>March 31</u>, <u>2017</u>. In December 2012, American photographer Matthew Schrier was captured by an Al-Qaeda affiliate in Syria. He was among a collection of kidnapped journalists held by jihadists in the city of Aleppo. Schrier strategically converted to Islam in March 2013 as a survival tactic. A strategy which later proved to be life-saving. In July 2013 Schrier became the first and only westerner to escape from al Qaeda. On Feb. 21 at 6 p.m. in the Pugh Hall Ocora Schrier will share his story of survival. ### Criticism of the Albigensian Crusade in Occitan Crusading Lyrics

Already marked as different by contemporary participants and witnesses, the Albigensian crusade was seen as a special kind of holy war. In fact, this crusade was not directed against pagans or Saracens, but against Christian heretics, the Albigenses or Cathars, and their protectors (a term that referred to all persons who took a stand against the Crusade). Initiated by Pope Innocent III, this occidental holy war started in 1209 following the assassination of the papal legate Peter of Castelnau. It lasted for twenty years and saw a profound modification of the structures of Occitan traditional society since it put French conquerors and Occitan collaborative leaders in positions of power. They killed and exiled a broad swath of the affected communities in the south of France, including not only heretics but also poets who made themselves undesirable by critiquing the war. This papal war, which was the beneficiary of crusade indulgences, was principally led by French lords from the region of Paris.

Indeed, as a crusade against Christian heretics in Christian occidental territories, the Albigensian Crusade was criticized by Occitan medieval poets, known as troubadours, in crusade lyric poetry. This Occitan literary corpus represents a consistent part of political and religious lyric songs of the first part of thirteenth century. Those sirventés against the Crusade saw it as a war that was "wrong" and they denounced rapacious clerics, the plunder of territories by French lords and armies, and the diversion of the crusade from its true and holy cause:

Jerusalem and the Holy Land. It is interesting to note that it is almost exclusively the Occitan texts that speak on the Crusade in Languedoc; French poets, by contrast, were virtually silent on this subject.

In this lecture, Dr. Raguin will present the typology of motifs and literary uses of the denunciation of this Albigensian Crusade in this lyric corpus. She will show which kind of arguments were used by poets, how they were applied, and in which historical and intellectual context they operated.

#### **Biography**

Marjolaine Raguin is currently a postdoctoral fellow in the Département de Langues et Littératures Romanes at the Université de Liège in Belgium. She earned her doctorate in medieval Occitan language and literature at the Université Paul Valéry de Montpellier in 2011. She is the author of *Lorsque la poésie fait le souverain: Étude sur la 'Chanson de la croisade albigeoise* (Paris: Honoré Champion 2015) and numerous articles and book chapters on Occitan poetry.

When you create your ORCID profile, you will receive a unique 16-digit identifier that will stay with you while you are at University of Florida and beyond, wherever your studies or research take you.

## 2017 WiSE Girlz Spring Science Camp

March 20-24, 2017



By whom: Women in Science and Engineering (WiSE) at UF

For whom: up to 15 selected 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grader middle school girls

What: experience exciting real-world science during spring break and become science advocates in the community.

This camp will include:

- hands-on experiments directly in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) departments at UF
- educational workshops with scientists and engineers on campus
- follow-up mentoring as the girls present themselves as science and engineering advocates

Five days filled with fun activities: collecting plants and bugs, building a telescope, meetings with scientists and students alike, creating a lasting network between the girls and the University of Florida.

After camp: Back in their schools or communities, the girls will present what they learned through talks, articles in local school papers, or a video. The possibilities are endless!

This experience will: demystify the prospects of a scientific career for girls, expose them to a range of scientific disciplines that they might not have considered or be aware of.

Cost: \$10 per day fee, financial aid available to cover the \$50.

The camp is comprised of the full 5 days (9am-5pm), with possibility of before- and after- camp care, and cannot be attended partially. Invitations space is limited.
